


VISION

We are shaped and reshaped for mission as we prayerfully discern God's will. As a community that is inclusive and accessible to all, we nurture and encourage each other's leadership in Christ's church. Recognizing God's love for all, we listen to each other, and seek to enable each other to be all that God intends.

We are the Body of Christ: a community of communities that freely shares of itself with others—a community that will shatter the complacency of this earth and bring God's intended peace and justice to all.

Church and Ministry Team

The Church and Ministry Team is a touchpoint for the churches and authorized (or seeking to be authorized) ministers of the Northwest Ohio Association. Yes, at times it can seem like just another "committee" (because we don't have enough of THOSE in our churches!). But I have come, over my six years on the Team, to see it as a point of connection. It was my first contact with the NWOA when I began my search over thirteen years ago—as it is for many of our new-to-the-area clergy. The Church and Ministry Team is an immediate "safety net," a group that hopefully lets pastors know that they are not alone. This is a service to our churches as well, as your pastors are better able to serve you knowing that there is support behind them from the NWOA via the Church and Ministry Team. The institutional work that we do with questions of standing, licensing, ordination, etc. are really (ideally) about that—serving our churches by making sure our clergy are supported, nurtured, and accountable. And I hope that the Team will also take seriously questions about how we can serve our churches even more by being a more assertive contact point for you.

What do we do? We hold welcome and exit interviews with pastors. Beyond establishing contact and sending with blessing, these give us insight into our churches—what we have in one another, what we need, and where we are struggling. We have had the blessing of discerning and celebrating one ordination this past year. This is by no means a rubber stamp. We due our due diligence of discernment along with our Members in Discernment so that churches can trust that their pastors are held to the high standards of preparation and character necessary for faithful and fruitful ministry. We stay connected with our clergy through annual reviews, the retired clergy luncheon, and support of Excellence in Ministry groups. In all of these ways, we hope that we are contributing to the health and growth of our clergy and churches.

As I step off the Church and Ministry Team, I am grateful to have had this window into the Northwest Ohio Association: our clergy and churches, the gifts and graces, the fears and struggles. And I leave with a prayer that we will continue to learn and grow into who we are: a community of communities where Christ is known.

<u>Discernment (Formerly In-Care) Working Group</u> <u>Church and Ministry Team</u>

The Discernment Working Group walks with members in the Northwest Ohio Association through a process of discernment when they sense a potential call to authorized ministry in the UCC. There is a procedural component to this work (making sure they fulfill the requisite steps and protocols as they move toward ordination) and a pastoral component (responding to the various and inevitable questions, joys, and twists and turns that come with discerning God's call upon one's life). We do this with the help of Member in Discernment advisors, who provide more personal support and guidance through the process. The process can lead either to new and different directions for a Member in Discernment or to presentation to the Church and Ministry Team for approval of ordination (pending a call to a local congregation). One of the ways we come alongside candidates is an annual review, in which MiDs are invited to share with the working group where they find themselves on the path of discernment and how the group can help.

We were able to celebrate the approval and ordination of one Member in Discernment in 2022: Mike Ebersole. Mike was approved at our November 29th meeting and was ordained at St. John's UCC (Baseline) on February 19th, 2023. He serves at both St. John's and College Hill UCC (Bloomville).

We received two new candidates into the Discernment process, both of whom have membership with St. Paul's UCC in Bellevue (Way to go, St. Paul's!). Adam Shanaman was approved at our November meeting. He is pursuing his M.Div. (mostly virtually) with Chicago Theological Seminary. We also welcomed Liesl Higgins at our November 29th meeting. Liesl is pursuing her M.Div. at Bethany Theological Seminary in Richmond, Indiana. They are two really great candidates.

One of our little projects has been revising the ordination paper prompts for our MiDs approaching their ordination interview. We are really looking at what kinds of guidance and questions help the Discernment Working Group, Church and Ministry Team, and the candidate themselves explore and see what most helps us in this mutual work of discernment.

Thank you for your continued support for the nine Members in Discernment currently on our roster. These individuals are at various points on their journeys, but each is supported by their local church, a MiD Advisor, and the NWOA as a whole. Discernment is a communal process.

Faith Formation Ministry Team

The Team has had much discussion over the past year about what the term Faith Formation means. We continue to review the role and mission of the team. Faith Formation goes beyond traditional Sunday School and should be lifelong learning.

We sent a survey to 72 member churches asking about Faith Formation needs and what we might be able to assist with. We received and reviewed 16 responses. We compiled a list of needs and began to ascertain what we could address.

We met with Rev Dr Marian Plant from the Heartland Conference Faith Formation Team for further guidance on the committee's role. We offered to be of assistance to the Heartland Conference Team if there is a need. She provided many ideas and helped to further define the Team's purpose.

We decided our theme for 2023 would be 'Connect' as this word kept coming up in our discussions. As a committee, we spend time sharing what is going on in our local churches. In 2023, we will look for ways to better connect within the association. Ideas included providing resources for churches and communicating what different churches are doing.

The committee recognizes that many churches are in a transition period after Covid and some are struggling to provide traditional Sunday School. We will continue to seek other relevant ways the Team can assist with Faith Formation.

We continue to meet quarterly over Zoom.

Stewardship and Generosity Ministry Team

As we move from the Covid experience of always online to the new "normal" of electronic and in person interactions, the team is looking forward to reestablishing the celebration of OCWM and 5 for 5 giving at the Association Annual Meeting. One of the key celebrations of the Annual Meeting is lifting up the faithful giving of our churches, which, in 22, saw an increase in giving to OCWM. Like the previous time before Covid, churches present at the Annual Meeting will have an opportunity to have their certificate presented in person with a picture being taken along with the church being promoted in upcoming Vine additions. Those not in attendance will have the certificates mailed to them.

It is encouraged that you take time to register yourself to receive many of the resources so that you don't have to wait for the Vine to come out. And don't forget to dig deep into the list to look what is in the resource section beyond some of the more current offerings.

A feature you will also note in the Vine is a prompt about upcoming special offerings in the hopes that you will have an early jump on promoting them as well as stories from our churches on some of their successful efforts to promote Stewardship and Generosity. These are written by members of the team and/or special contributors. You have full access to these to use creatively in your communications. Simply be sure to acknowledge the appropriate source.

The team is looking forward to the chance to gather people in person in the coming year, for large group training events, individual church consultations (perhaps in a small cluster cohort with coaching), as well as looking forward to an annual Stewardship and Generosity event that we might do in conjunction with the National, Conference or other Association efforts, all the better to share wisdom and insights that can impact a local church.

El Salvador Coordinating Team Iglesia Luterana Salvadorena - Our Global Partner

Our El Salvador Coordinating Team hasn't met for over a year. It has been almost 20 years since Joyce and I have been leading mission trips to El Salvador. We have both hit the age of 87 and are still in good health but feel it is time for some others to lead these trips. It has been a rewarding experience to be able to travel with many new made friends through all these years. We have met two US ambassadors, a Spanish ambassador and an Italian ambassador plus other influential persons from other countries who were sending aid to El Salvador. Each person, who traveled with us, usually had two suitcases filled with different sizes of articles of clothing, soccer balls, a lot of school supplies and medical supplies for doctors and nurses for clinics and hospitals. \$50,000.00 was given by our NWOA to help build their new cathedral church building. It is now where they have their worship services. Many others have donated money for the health clinic, the church schools, soup kitchen and for other needs of the people. I remember one young man had been cutting wood with a machete and hit his foot. He had a bad wound on his foot. He lived a long way from the city so we collected money from our group and gave it to their pastor to see that he got to the city to see a doctor. This is just one of the many memories from experiences that we had from former mission trips.

Life in El Salvador is not easy for the average person. If you have a job, the wages are very low with long hours. We know some doctors are lucky to make \$30,000 a year. The poverty and living conditions for the average person needs to be improved. There is a small portion of the population that are very wealthy. A little larger part of the population are middle-class people and 27.4% of the population are living on less than \$5.50 a day. This is the problem. The wealthy control all the banks, most of the newspapers, most of the farmland and are in control of the government of the country.

The government is now building a new prison to hold over 60,000 prisoners. A pastor and a church worker have been put in prison because someone didn't like them. They were accused of

doing something bad. Without a hearing, they were incarcerated. Our friend, the Rev. Christian Chavarria got in to visit the one pastor over a year ago and she still has not had a hearing. There are many innocent people in the prisons with the gang members.

The relationship with the El Salvadoran Lutheran Church and our Northwest Ohio Association is still strong. Well over 200 people, including youth groups from our association and a group from Heidelberg University, have traveled with us to El Salvador through these years. We know this is a worthwhile mission that should continue. It is now time for a new leader or leaders to step up and say, "We Can Do It!" Joyce and I will help the new leaders any way we can. Our many friends in El Salvador are waiting for the next group to return and will welcome each one with a big smile and a hug. We have never been afraid in El Salvador because the church leaders would never put us in a dangerous situation.

Excellence in Ministry Program

My friends, I am sure that you are very good and that you have all the knowledge you need to teach each other. - Romans 15:14 CEV

Excellence in Ministry is an innovative program which is supported and resourced by National Ministries of the United Church of Christ. In Northwest Ohio Association, nine trained facilitators lead regular gatherings of three to seven authorized ministers in "communities of practice." These groups, generally meet for at least two hours a month between September and May.

Blending personal support and professional development, Excellence in Ministry groups offer ministers the opportunity to gather in a supportive and confidential setting to be renewed in worship, share their questions and experiences, and support one another in facing challenges. Groups foster the sharing of ministry resources and best practices. Because ministry is often an isolated calling, these communities of practice provide opportunities for fellowship and help maintain high standards of pastoral practice.

49 members and leaders in Northwest Ohio make up the eight groups participating in the program during the 2022-23 program year. Although this is down very slightly from last year, our association is fortunate to have a very high percentage of pastors involved.

Facilitators this year are Wendy Schindler Chasney, Ken Daniel, Joel Fetter, Ed Heilman, Darla Metz, Margaret Mills, David Orr, Becky Erb Strang, and Diane Thomas. Facilitators meet quarterly. In August they participated in training provided by Rev. Tara Barber, UCC Minister of Support and Accountability.

Congregations can help their pastors by encouraging them to join a group and by covering the cost of their participation. Summer is the ideal time to start as groups are realigned each September. Applications are available from the Northwest Ohio Association office.

Lay School Board

The aim of the Lay School of Religion Program has been to maintain quality instruction, to create an atmosphere for Christian fellowship and dialogue, and to encourage growth in faith and understanding so as to enhance the local church's efforts to develop deeper and stronger faith communities for nurture, witness, mission and leadership. All persons are welcome to enroll in the Lay School of Religion Program for personal enrichment.

The Lay School offers classes in the spring and fall of each year, typically on Tuesday evenings twice a month for six to eight sessions. Anyone may enroll in classes for personal enrichment. However, to graduate from the program students must complete all ten offered classes plus approved workshops in the areas of Stewardship and Evangelism. In 2022, our classes were UCC History & Polity taught by Rev. Dan Busch, and Caring Ministries taught my Dr. Traci Stark from Heidelberg University. We also sponsored an evangelism workshop on "Ministry to Millennials" with Steve Lawler of The Walker Leadership Institute at Eden Theological Seminary.

One ongoing project is to clarify the mission and purpose of the Lay School, particularly in conjunction with the work of Church and Ministry and Faith Formation teams of the Association in order to offer programs to benefit all members of the Association. We have also looked at the Living Water Association model called S.P.I.R.E. and encourage others to look at their offerings as well, many of which are offered virtually.

We hope more folks from the churches of Northwest Ohio Association will consider deepening their faith and growing in leadership through the Lay School. Together, we can enhance the ministry of our local churches.
